Warehouse & Dock Safety

OSHA recently announced a National Emphasis Program (NEP) for Warehousing at the distribution centers and high injury rate retail centers. Although your facility may not be covered under the scope of this NEP, potential hazards exist at all warehousing facilities. What hazards are workers exposed to in the yard, at the loading docks and within the warehouse? Does an employer need to have a dock /warehouse safety program? These questions will be answered by focusing on the recognition of serious struck-by, caught-in and repetitive motion hazards.

Advancing Your SHMS & SHARP?

OSHA's Wisconsin Consultation Program, WisCon, uses a 58-question survey to assess the SHMSs (safety and health management systems) of companies. Learn how to use this tool at your facilities and avoid the not-so-obvious pitfalls that we sometimes observe. WisCon's elite SHARP (Safety and Health Achievement Recognition Program) certification will also be described.

The Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) course, designed and built on the Avoid, Deny, Defend strategy developed by ALERRT, provides strategies, guidance, and a proven plan for surviving an active shooter event. Topics include the history and prevalence of active shooter events, the role of professional guardians, civilian response options and medical issues.

Is your work place safe? Are you able to spot hazards in the workplace? Unfortunately, we tend to see what we focus on, and when we relate this to the workplace, hazards often go unnoticed because we are not looking or have become lost in the big picture. When workers are taken out of their element of everyday restraints, pressures, and responsibilities of their jobs and asked to look for hazards, it's amazing what one may find. In this session, we will take a proactive approach to safety by identifying present hazards, discussing the types of incidents that may result from exposure to the hazards, and determining what control measures could be used to protect workers.

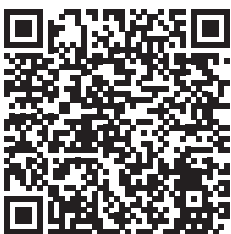
