Transferring to UW-Superior

The University of Wisconsin-Superior accepts credits for transfer to satisfy major requirements as noted in this guide. Grades earned must be a "D-" grade (or higher) for transfer. Some degree programs require at least a "C" or higher in order to transfer. To transfer credits an official transcript must be sent directly to the University of Wisconsin-Superior, as part of the university admissions process.

• Cumulative GPA of at least 2.0 for entrance into the university.

UW-Superior's Graduation Requirements

Overall Bachelor's Degree requirements:

- Completion of the University Studies requirements.
- Completion of the requirements for major, minor and/or comprehensive major.
- 120 (or more) total undergraduate credits, i.e. courses numbered 100-499.
- 36 (or more) undergraduate credits in upper-division courses, i.e. courses numbered 300-499.
- A resident grade point average of 2.0 (or above) for all undergraduate credits.
- 30 (or more) undergraduate credits earned at UW-Superior.
- The last 12 undergraduate credits earned at UW-Superior.
- Bachelor of Arts requires completion of 6-credits of foreign language.
